

Born in Iowa, reared in Kansas, a graduate of the University of Kansas, the recipient of advanced degrees from Harvard, a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford, much honored at home and abroad, you have made exceptionally distinguished contributions to the economic development of foreign countries and to the advancement of efficient government responsive to human needs. And there is at least one person present on this occasion, a sometime graduate student at Harvard, now a college president, who can testify to your able leadership as a university dean and to your effectiveness as an inspiring teacher.
