HARRY HILL, distinguished son of these West Virginia hills and Concord College, like many of your classmates of fifty years ago you began your teaching career in a one-room country school before seeking a higher education here. Following your graduation from this School, you served for two years in the United States Army during World War I, receiving the Purple Heart and Silver Star in the defense of freedom on the battlefields of Europe. A war behind you, you continued your search for knowledge at West Virginia University where you earned your bachelor's and master's degrees, and later earned your Doctor of Philosophy degree in physics at the University of Chicago. Your research and publications in the fields of spectroscopy and thermodynamics are well-known, and we assume that your study of electrical build-ups in West Texas sandstorms dealt with physics rather than politics. On your day of graduation in 1917 you delivered the class address, and today you bring the greetings of your classmates to Concord's latest graduates. To a loyal son of Concord College and to a scholar and teacher goes one of our honors today by our conferring upon you Concord's degree of Doctor of Science.

In testimony of this degree I hand you this diploma and cause you to be invested with this hood.
