2+2 Agreement

Concord University and Eastern West Virginia Community & Technical College for the Bachelor of Science (B.S.) in Elementary Education

PURPOSE

West Virginia ranks near last in baccalaureate degree attainment and is experiencing significant shortages in teacher education and the applied sciences. To meet the economic needs of the state and to ensure an educated, prepared workforce, Concord University will provide the Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education program to Eastern West Virginia Community and Technical College (Eastern) students. Students will be required to complete the Associate in Science with a concentration in Elementary Education as outlined in this agreement.

ELEMENTS OF THE AGREEMENT

Students who complete the Eastern Associate of Science (A.S.) degree with a concentration in Elementary Education courses from Concord, including teacher education preparatory coursework from Concord, will be eligible to apply for the Bachelor of Science (B.S.) in Elementary Education Program with Concord following the timeline below.

TIMELINE

Spring/Summer 2024

- Timeline and 2+2 Agreement presented for approval.
- Institutional presidents sign the 2+2 Agreement.
- Courses offered by Concord will be provided online.
- Concord will offer all Education courses. Concord will provide all education faculty assignments.
- Program is advertised, and cohorts are recruited at host sites for the new program, which begins Fall 2024.
- The following are components of the new program which should be addressed at host sites:
 - Meet with county officials to discuss background checks, TB testing, ID Badges (Eastern)
 - Orientation for Field Placements
 - Define additional administrative help on both campuses

Fall 2024

- New program formally begins and students from host sites can continue with general education courses to prepare for admission.
- Eastern students register as transient students with Concord (GEOL 101).
- Students must follow the implementation schedule for the courses.
- Education courses from Concord must be taken in the semester and sequence of this agreement.

Spring 2025

- Students must follow the implementation schedule for the courses to remain in the cohort.

Fall 2025

- Students continue entry-level education courses and other support courses needed prior to admission to the Program.
- Students apply for the Program (Application Deadline, October 1, 2025).

- Eastern students register as transient students with Concord (EDSP 303, EDUC 210, 210L, & MTH 305).
- Students must meet all of the admission requirements for acceptance into the Program at Concord prior to the beginning of Spring 2026.

Spring 2026

- Students continue entry-level education courses and other support courses needed prior to admission to the Program.
- Eastern students register as transient students with Concord (EDUC 301, EDUC 304, & EDUC 305/305L).
- Students complete the Eastern A.S. degree.
- Students attend a Pre-Admission seminar for Concord University's Teacher Education Program.
- Student submits application materials to Concord University.
- Student submits the Concord University Teacher Education Program application and portfolio to Concord University's Teacher Education Program by the last working day in February by 4:00pm.

Fall 2026

- Students will continue Concord courses for the 3rd and 4th year.

Fall 2027

- Students begin a one-year residency. Residency will be completed in Eastern's service area.

Role of the Eastern Education Program Coordinator

The Education Program Coordinator will be the primary liaison between Eastern and Concord, providing leadership for the education program faculty, staff, and students. Responsibilities include, but are not limited to:

- Develop and maintain relationships with local, state, regional, and national education agencies involved in the development and certification of teachers.
- Serve as a liaison and maintain a close working relationship with the partner institution-- Concord, Division of Education.
- Establish and maintain liaison with the central administration and other departments at Eastern.
- Facilitate student completion of paperwork for admissions to both EWVCTC and Concord, semester registration, application to Concord program, transient registration, and guidance in financial aid requirements.

- Facilitate orientation for residency faculty at each school placement.
- Liaison between students and Concord faculty.
- Facilitate faculty development and conduct performance reviews.
- Recommend faculty for appointment.
- Advise students and ensure their appropriate matriculation through the education program.
- Certify students for graduation and readiness to articulate to the Concord program.
- Coordinate student-teacher placements.
- Develop partnership agreements with local boards of education.
- Prepare class schedules and recommend appropriate adjunct faculty qualified to teach in the program to the Interim VP of Academics & Student Services.
- Prepare all reports and assessment processes needed by the institution regarding the program.

Financial Aid

Students who qualify for financial aid will receive financial aid at Eastern for years 1 and 2. They will be registered for Concord courses as a "transient student." Upon graduation from Eastern and acceptance into the Concord Elementary Education Program, they become Concord students, and financial aid rules and policies in place at Concord will apply. Any courses taken at Eastern will be as a transient student and must be approved by Concord.

TERM & Termination of Agreement

This agreement may be terminated at the request of either party upon thirty (30) days' written notification to the other party. If the program is terminated, students currently enrolled in the program will be allowed to complete the program within the two-year period of the termination date.

This Agreement will be effective upon execution and will continue for an initial term of four (4) years. Following the initial term, this Agreement may be renewed, upon mutual written consent by the parties, for three (3) successive one (1) years periods.

Complimentary Minors

Students who pursue a degree in Elementary Education should consider pursuing a complimentary minor in Early Childhood Intervention or Special Education. Upon obtaining their initial teaching license, students have the option to take a Praxis II exam in these areas to add an endorsement to their license. The minor coursework provides the content knowledge to pass the Praxis II exams.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Courses marked with an asterisk are part of the Elementary content area, and will also be counted for General Education Program coursework. Other majors allow for flexibility in General Education coursework, but the Elementary Education Program does not; students must take the designated courses.
- Semester 1—Take any math class 101 or above (excluding MATH 305). If MATH103 is chosen, another MATH101 or above course must be taken Semester 2; You may choose either GEOL101 or PHSC104: Concepts in Physical Science: Earth/ Space Sciences.
- Semester 3 Landmark—Students should begin taking the Praxis Core Exams no later than this semester. Core Praxis prep course and study material/information available on CU Department of Education webpage. By the end of this semester, students should obtain an overall GPA of at least 2.50 in order to apply for the Teacher Education Program during Semester 4.
- Semester 4 Landmark—Students should apply to the Teacher Education Program no later than this semester. Note—candidates must have a 2.5 GPA to apply. Check out the [application process](#) online!
- Semester 5—EDUC 308 and EDUC 309 must be taken concurrently.
- Semester 6 — EDUC412, EDUC413 and EDUC414 must be taken concurrently. All other education coursework should be completed prior to enrolling in these courses; Landmark—Students should begin taking PLT and Praxis II exams no later than this semester. These must all be passed prior to Semester 8. By the end of this semester students must obtain all GPAs require for Year Long Residency admission. Refer to admission requirements listed on the Department of Education webpage!
- Semesters 7 & 8—Year-Long Residency. The elementary program participates in a year-long residency model. This model enables teacher candidates to spend a year in the same classroom with the same students and cooperating teacher. This model has proven to deepen the professional relationships within the school as well provide teacher candidates with more practical experiences over longer periods of time. Our candidates report feeling more effective and confident during their first year of teaching. During Semester 7 students will be in a public-school classroom 4 days per week. During semester 8, students will be in a public-school classroom 5 days per week.

Attain an overall GPA of at least 2.50 in all coursework attempted (including transfer credit). The Cohort Average Overall GPA of candidates during the semester of application must be at least 3.00. If the cohort average is not met, individual candidates with an overall GPA of less than 2.75 (beginning with the lowest applicant GPA) will be denied program admission, until the 3.00 cohort average has been met.

Completion of a Basic Skills Competency Assessment in Reading, Writing and Math by the CU Department of Education Office (see page 3 of TEP Admission Packet for competency criteria). The Basic Skills Competency Assessment will be included in candidate's TEP status letter. Candidates who do not meet competency criteria at the time of TEP application will be eligible for TEP Provisional Admission, as long as all other TEP admission requirements have been met. Competency criteria must be met prior to residency admission, and for a candidate to transition to TEP Full Admission.
