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ADVISING

When you choose to pursue this degree, you will be assigned an advisor who is an expert in the field of Special Education. This advisor can help you with course selection, career planning and will help you with tracking your path to degree completion.

CAREERS

Graduates of the Teacher Education Program are eligible for licensure in West Virginia, and in other states through reciprocal agreements.

COMPLIMENTARY MINORS

Students who pursue a degree in Special Education should consider pursuing a complimentary minor in Early Childhood Intervention. Upon obtaining their initial teaching license, students have the option to take a Praxis II exam to add endorsements to their license. Minor coursework provides content knowledge to pass Praxis II exams. Students who receive financial aid should consult with their academic advisor or the financial aid office to ensure financial aid coverage of minor courses.

Helpful Hints

- •Courses marked with an asterisk in the 'choice lists' are part of the Special Ed. content area, and will also be counted for General Education Program coursework. Other majors allow for flexibility in General Education coursework; Special Education doesn't.
- •Clinical Experiences I, II & III each require 45-hours of clinical experience in a special education setting (excluding Autism). This is outside of course-time
- •Semester 2 landmark— Students should attend a Pre-Admission to Teacher Education Program (TEP) Seminar during this semester, but no later than semester 3
- •Semester 3 & 4 Landmark —Students are eligible to apply to TEP during semester 3, but should apply no later than semester 4. Note—candidates must have a 2.5 GPA to apply. Check out the application process online!
- •Semester 4 EDSP317 & EDSP318 must be taken concurrently. These are spring only offerings.
- •Semester 5—EDSP365 and EDSP370 must be taken concurrently; these are fall only offerings. All education coursework from this semester forward requires TEP
- Semester 6 EDSP380 is a spring only offering. EDSP412, EDSP413 and EDSP414 must be taken concurrently.
- Semester 6 Landmark—Students should begin taking Praxis II exams after midterm of this semester. The exams must be passed prior to Semester 8. By the end of semester 6, students must obtain all GPAs required for Residency admission, as well as meet Basic Skills Competency in Reading, Writing & Math. Refer to admission requirements listed on the Department of Education webpage!
- •Semesters 7 & 8—Year-Long Residency. All education programs participate in the year-long residency model. This model enables teacher candidates to spend a year in the same classroom, with the same cooperating teacher. During Semester 7 students will be in a public school classroom 4 full days per week. During semester 8, students will be in a public school classroom 5 full days per week. Students should not enroll in additional coursework during residency.
