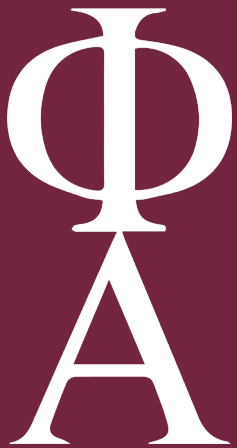
Concord Social Work Organization

What Does It Take to Earn a Degree in Social Work?

The Bachelor of Social Work Degree (BSW) requires the successful completion of 120 semester hours, including: (1) The Program of General Studies, which includes the designated liberal arts content; (2) The Social Work Program Core Courses; and (3) A program of electives worked out with the student's advisor. Detailed admissions requirements may be found in the Social Work Student Handbook.

What Can CU's Social Work Program Do for Me?

Graduates of the Social Work Program at Concord University are well-prepared to enter the profession upon graduation. The commitment to the students is exemplified by:

- Graduates are either employed in the social work field (most either during or after completion of their internship) or accepted to graduate school.
- Continuous and ongoing contact with community agencies and organizations.
- BSW's are given special consideration for civil service ranking.
- Availability of public service scholarships with direct access to jobs with the state-wide Department of Health and Human Resources.
- Fully Accredited since 1974 by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE).
